


# Accessing Affordable Healthcare in Iowa

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# GLOSSARY

## **AFFORDABLE CARE ACT (ACA) aka OBAMA CARE**

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) expanded Medicaid to people with incomes up to 138% of the federal poverty level (the poverty level in the continental U.S. is \$15,650 for a single individual and \$32,150 for a family of four in 2025); created new health insurance exchange markets through which individuals can purchase coverage and receive financial help to afford premiums and cost sharing, in addition to separate exchange markets through which small businesses can purchase coverage; and requires employers that do not offer affordable coverage to pay penalties, with exceptions for small employers (Ortaliza et al., 2025).

## **CATEGORICAL ELIGIBILITY**

A phrase describing Medicaid's policy of restricting eligibility to individuals in certain groups or categories, such as children, the aged, or individuals with disabilities. Individuals who fall into approved categories must also satisfy financial eligibility requirements, including income and, in most cases, resource tests imposed by the states in which they reside (KFF, 2013).

## **CENTERS FOR MEDICARE AND MEDICAID SERVICES (CMS)**

A federal agency within the United States Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) that administers the Medicare program and works in partnership with state governments to administer Medicaid, the State

Children's Health Insurance Program, and health insurance portability standards (Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, n.d.-a).

## **CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM (CHIP)**

Established in 1997, CHIP provides federal matching funds to states in order to establish medical coverage sources for individuals under age 19 whose parents earn too much income to qualify for Medicaid, but not enough to pay for private coverage (Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, n.d.-a).

## **DEDUCTIBLE**

The amount you pay for covered health care services before your insurance plan starts to pay. With a \$2,000 deductible, for example, you pay the first \$2,000 of covered services yourself (U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid, n.d.-b).

## **DUAL ELIGIBLE**

An individual who is eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid benefits (KFF, 2013).

## **FEE-FOR-SERVICE (FFS)**

A traditional method of paying for medical services under which doctors and hospitals are paid for each service they provide. Bills are either paid by the patient who then submits them to the insurance company or are submitted by the provider to the patient's insurance carrier for reimbursement (KFF, 2013).

## FINANCIAL ELIGIBILITY

In order to qualify for Medicaid, an individual must meet both categorical and financial eligibility requirements. Financial eligibility requirements vary from state to state and from category to category, but they generally include limits on the amount of income and the amount of resources an individual is allowed to have in order to qualify for coverage (KFF, 2013).

## MANAGED CARE PLANS (MCPs)

Managed Care Plans (MCPs), which may include health plans combined with separate dental plans, contract with HHS to provide Iowa Medicaid members with comprehensive healthcare and dental services. These services include physical health, behavioral health, dental health and long-term services and supports (Iowa HHS, 2024).

## MANAGED CARE ORGANIZATIONS (MCOs)

In the context of Medicaid, Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) contract with state Medicaid agencies and accept a set per-member-per-month payment to deliver Medicaid health benefits and additional services to enrollees (Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, n.d.-a). By paying MCPs a fixed amount per member in advance, the MCOs are at financial risk if the cost of care exceeds this rate and thus gives them an incentive to provide value-based care. The MCPs are responsible for providing all covered Medicaid benefit services a beneficiary may need, as medically necessary (Iowa HHS, 2024b).

## PREMIUM

The amount you pay for your health insurance every month even if you don't use medical services that month. In the ACA marketplace, there are four categories of health insurance plans: Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Platinum. These categories show how you and your plan share healthcare costs (U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid, n.d.-a).

## PRESUMPTIVE ELIGIBILITY

The option available to states to extend limited Medicaid coverage (with federal matching payments) to certain groups of individuals from the point a qualified provider determines that the individual's income does not exceed the eligibility threshold until a formal determination of eligibility is made by the state Medicaid agency. The groups to whom states may offer Medicaid coverage during a presumptive eligibility period are pregnant people, children, and individuals diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer (KFF, 2013).

## RESOURCES

Sometimes referred to as assets, resources are items of economic value that are not income. Resources include financial instruments such as savings accounts and certificates of deposit, personal property such as an automobile (above a specified value), and real estate (other than an individual's home). Some Medicaid eligibility groups must meet a resource test; others are not subject to a resource test (KFF, 2013).

# Medicaid

Medicaid, a public health insurance program, provides health coverage to low-income individuals and families, including children, parents, pregnant individuals, seniors, and people with disabilities. It is funded jointly by the federal government and the states. Within federal guidelines, each state has considerable flexibility in how it operates its own Medicaid program. Eligibility and covered benefits vary substantially by state (Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, 2025).

## Why Medicaid is Important

As of September 2025, 69.8 million people with low incomes in the U.S. got their health coverage through Medicaid (Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, 2025). In 2024, the U.S. Census Bureau's Health Inclusive Poverty Measure (HIPM), an alternative poverty measure that treats health insurance as a basic need like food and housing, estimated that **Medicaid lifted 15 million people out of poverty** by providing essential health care coverage to people who weren't covered by their employer and those who couldn't afford to pay for it individually, making it the third most impactful anti-poverty program in the United States (Creamer, 2025).

Over half of U.S. Medicaid spending goes to providing services to seniors and people with disabilities, most of it for long-term services and supports like home- and community-based services and nursing home care. Children make up over one-third of program enrollees but account for just one-sixth of its spending (Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, 2025).



# Eligibility

Eligibility is based on financial and non-financial criteria, such as income, assets, citizenship, Iowa residency, immigration status and disability status.

## House of Medicaid

Medicaid is like a house with several different ways to enter. Iowans can access Medicaid through a variety of programs based on their income, family size, age, and other circumstances.



# Medicaid Eligibility Groups

## ▶ IOWA HEALTH AND WELLNESS PLAN (IHAWP)

- Individuals ages 19-64
- Same non-financial eligibility requires as Medicaid
- Income at or below 138% Federal Poverty Level (FPL)
- Not eligible for Medicaid under the mandatory coverage groups
- Not entitled to or enrolled in Medicare

## ▶ HEALTHY AND WELL KIDS IN IOWA (HAWKI)

- Children under 19 years of age
- Income at or below 302% FPL for both Hawki and Hawki Dental only
- Premiums are based on family income. No family pays more than \$40 per month. Some families pay nothing at all

## ▶ FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM (FPP)

- Limited coverage for family planning-related services for individuals ages 12-54
- Income at or below 300% FPL
- Resident of Iowa, U.S. citizen or qualified non-citizen capable of bearing or fathering children
- Not currently receiving Medicaid or IHAWP

## ▶ PROGRAM OF ALL-INCLUSIVE CARE FOR THE ELDERLY (PACE)

- Age 55 or older
- Live in select Iowa counties
- Be certified by state as eligible for nursing home care
- Live in the community (not a nursing home)
- Be able to live safely in the community
- Agree to receive health services exclusively through a PACE organization

## ▶ IOWA HEALTH LINK

- Age 65 or older
- Blind, have a disability
- Have families with dependent children
- Pregnant women, children (up to age 21)
- Children formerly in foster care (up to age 26)
- Adults ages 19-64
- Individuals with breast and/or cervical cancer or precancerous conditions

## ▶ DENTAL WELLNESS PLAN (DWP)

- Enrolled adults and children

## ▶ MEDICAID FOR EMPLOYED PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES (MEPD)

- Disabled adults aged 18-64 (based on SSA definition of disability)
- Earned income from wage or self-employment
- Net family income and asset limits
- Monthly premium based on total monthly income




# Medicaid in Iowa


The program is an important source of coverage for many populations in Iowa. During the State Fiscal Year 2025:









\* Race and ethnicity data in Medicaid are self-reported and optional. A substantial portion of records lack this information due to historical enrollment practices, renewals that do not require re-collection of demographic data, and federal requirements that prohibit states from mandating disclosure. As a result, race and ethnicity data should be interpreted with caution. This level of missing data limits the state's ability to fully assess disparities, underscoring the importance of improved data collection efforts going forward.


## Medicaid Births

# The Cost of Not Having Affordable Healthcare Coverage


## Being Uninsured in the United States

Unaffordable medical bills can lead to medical debt, particularly for uninsured adults. In 2024, more than six in ten (62%) uninsured adults reported having health care debt compared to over four in ten (44%) insured adults. Uninsured adults are more likely to face negative consequences due to health care debt, such as using up savings, having difficulty paying other living expenses, or borrowing money (Tolbert et al., 2024).

About one-third (36%) of adults say that in the past 12 months they have skipped or postponed getting the health care they needed because of the cost. Notably three in four (75%) uninsured adults under age 65 say they went without needed care because of the cost (Sparks et al., 2025).


## Uninsured Rates for People in Iowa Ages 0-64, 2025

### BY COUNTY





# Affordable Care Act (ACA) Marketplaces

Health insurance Marketplaces (also known as Exchanges) are organized markets where individuals and families can shop for and enroll in health insurance online, over the phone, or in person. Marketplaces offer a choice of different health plans, certify plans that participate, and provide information to help consumers understand their options and apply for coverage.

The Marketplace also makes financial assistance, such as premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions, available to enrollees based on their income (KFF, 2025c).

Each plan must provide the essential health benefits including: ambulatory patient services; emergency services; hospitalization; pregnancy, maternity, and newborn care; mental health and substance use disorder services, including behavioral health treatment; prescription drugs; rehabilitative and habilitative services and devices; laboratory services; preventive and wellness services and chronic disease management; and pediatric services, including oral and vision care. It is also required that the scope of benefits be equal to that of a “typical employer plan” (U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, 2025).

## **PREMIUM TAX CREDITS aka PREMIUM SUBSIDIES**

Premium tax credits, also known as premium subsidies, reduce enrollees’ monthly payments for insurance coverage (Ortaliza et al., 2025).

The premium tax credit (PTC) is a refundable credit that helps eligible individuals and families cover the premiums for their health insurance purchased through the Health Insurance Marketplace. To get this credit, you must meet certain requirements and file a tax return with Form 8962, Premium Tax Credit (IRS, 2025).

## PREMIUM TAX CREDIT ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA (IRS, 2025)

### Individuals may be eligible for Premium Tax Credits if they:

- Have household income that falls within a certain range.
  - › Household income must be at least 100% and, for years other than 2021 and 2022, no more than 400% of the Federal Poverty Line (FPL) for family size. Some exceptions for those with incomes below 100% FPL may apply.
- Do not file a tax return using the filing status of Married Filing Separately.
- Cannot be claimed as a dependent by another person.
- In the same month you or a family member need to meet these additional requirements:
  - › Have health insurance coverage through a Health Insurance Marketplace for which the share of the premium not covered by advance credit payments is paid by the due date of your return.
  - › Are not able to get affordable coverage through an eligible employer-sponsored plan that provides minimum value.
  - › Are not eligible for coverage through a government program, like Medicaid, Medicare, CHIP or TRICARE.


In Iowa, the second lowest premium cost for a silver plan for a 40 year old (based on county costs and weighted by county plan selections) was \$501 per month.

Marketplace plans are put into four metal levels: Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Platinum. These categories do not indicate the quality of care members receive. Instead it represents the amount the plan pays and the amount the individual pays. Typically an individual will pay more of the share of medical costs in a Bronze plan (40%) than a Platinum plan (10%) (U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, n.d.-c).


The premiums depicted to the left are monthly and may include premiums for non-essential health benefits such as chiropractic care, cosmetic dentistry, or long-term nursing home care. These premiums were analyzed using the lowest cost premium for bronze, silver, and gold categories available to Iowans.

# ACA Marketplace Resources

## Some important reminders about Open Enrollment:

You can apply during Open Enrollment from November 1–December 15 for coverage that begins January 1 the following year. Open Enrollment completely closes January 15.

You can apply at anytime if you have had a qualifying life event within the last 60 days including:


- loss of coverage,
- birth of a child,
- marriage,
- or moved to a new state.

If you have lost Medicaid, you have 90 days from loss of coverage to enroll.

If you are re-enrolling in the Marketplace, it's important that you complete your re-enrollment application by the deadline.
